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Travel, Exploration, and Science

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1. [Antarctic. British Antarctic Expedition, 1910-13.] A collection of rock specimens, collected in the Antarctic by Patrick Keohane, a member of Captain Scott's last expedition. £8,500

Nine geological specimens, ranging in size from $8 \times 6 \times 5$ cm to $1.5 \times 1.5 \times 1$ cm., eight with typed captions pasted to one face, the ninth lacking its caption, and with a box of approx. 12 smaller specimens, the box captioned by hand "CLOUDMAKER MOUNTAIN COLLECTION CHRISTMASS 1912", several of the labels rather aged but most of them legible.

Patrick Keohane (1879-1950) was a Petty Office on Captain Scott's Terra Nova Antarctic Expedition. He played a significant role during the expedition: included in the party that supported Scott's march to the South Pole, he was also among those who - initially in March 1912, and later in October that year - went in search for Scott and his companions. These geological samples from the expedition once belonged to Keohane. Though the official expedition geologists, Griffith Taylor and Frank Debenham, worked on building collections of specimens, such collecting was also encouraged among all expedition members. As Debenham wrote in his contribution to the expedition narrative, "the geological work of the Expedition was particularly comprehensive and was one of the chief items in the scientific syllabus of the Expedition" (Scott's Last Expedition vol. II, p. 440).

Keohane's specimens - which were originally brought to market at Christie's in 2005 - derive from disparate origins, as recorded by the typed labels (or fragments of labels) attached to them: "Stone out of hole made for Cross erected in memory of Polar Party"; "Granite Pillars Beardmore Glassier"; "Granite Granite Harbour"; "Collection Cloudmaker at Beardmore Glassier 24th December 1911"; "Keynite Cape Armit[age]"; "[Ade]lie Penguin Cape Royds Rock"; "Fosil Wood Evans Coves 1913'. The box of stones labelled "Cloudmaker Mountain Collection Christmass 1912", may derive from the specimens brought back by the collecting party that visited the region earlier in the expedition.





2. [Antarctic.] Islands (Southern Ocean). Copy "of the Correspondence between the Lords of the Admiralty and the Committee of Lloyd's, with respect to Her Majesty's Ships calling at the Islands between the Cape of Good Hope and Australia, to relieve those Shipwrecked upon them." *Ordered, by the House of Commons, to be Printed*, 15 June, 1876. **£950**

Cf. Renard 513 (map). This is an unrecorded British Parliamentary paper, the map to which shows the Antarctic (the map is separately noted by Renard, but not the paper itself). The report ostensibly is concerned with the disappearance of three ships on the route from Britain to Australia. The first letter, from the Secretary at Lloyd's to the Lords of the Admiralty, suggests that a ship be sent from the Australia station to inspect the Crozet and other small islands, on which survivors of shipwrecks might find shelter. The reply from the Lords, by Rear-Admiral Robert Hall, proposes that such examinations be made by ships en route from the Cape to Australia. He also recommends that shipping avoid "going too far south, and making the run amongst icebergs and floating ice", and by way of illustrating his remarks offers the accompanying map as an illustration. The map itself is entitled "Ice Chart of the Southern Hemisphere", and measures approx. 64 x 85cm. Based on observations from the voyages of Cook, Bellingshausen, Weddell, Foster, Biscoe, Balleny, D'Urville, Wilkes and Ross, it is corrected to October 1874 and shows the extent of icebergs year-round as well as the known features of the Antarctic.

A fine mezzotint portrait, engraved by J. Scott from the original of Stephen Pearce, approx. $21 \frac{1}{2} \times 16 \frac{1}{2}$ " to plate mark (overall size $24 \times 18 \frac{1}{2}$ "), lettered below image, PSA blindstamp to lower right corner inside plate mark; light staining or spotting to margins, the image itself in good condition, some creasing to margins outside of plate mark.

William Penny (1809-1892) was a Scottish sailor who from the age of 12 joined his father on whaling expeditions to the Arctic. His expertise led to him being approached to take part in the search for the lost Arctic expedition under Sir John Franklin. In 1850, in charge of the ships Lady Franklin and Sophia, he joined the expedition under Captain Horatio Austin to investigate the areas of Wellington Channel and Beechey Island. After wintering at Assistance Bay on Cornwallis Island, Penny proceeded to the Wellington Channel, discovering there Queens Channel and the eponymous Penny Strait. A disagreement with Austin led to his return to Scotland, but his contribution was recognised with the portrait of him by Stephen Pearce (now in the National Portrait Gallery). This engraved mezzotint taken from the original painting is one of several depicting those who took part in the search for Franklin


4. [Arctic. Victorian Christmas Card.] 'A Merry Christmas.' [?London], n.d. c. 1870s. £95

A chromolithograph card, approx. 113 x 78mm., gilt decorated borders, with two images, the first showing a Royal Navy ship in Arctic seas with polar bears, whales and gulls, highlighted with glitter, pasted as issued at lower margin to the card with, pasted on behind the first image, a second one showing the celebrations taking place inside the ship with the caption "Home Sweet Home. God Save the Queen", this leaf also lifting to reveal the message "Compliments of the Season"; greetings message in hand to verso, and adhesion marks to verso where removed from an album, else VG

A nicely produced card by one of the principal manufacturers of Victorian greetings cards. The images probably refer to the Nares Arctic Expedition of 1875-6.









5. [Arctic.] [Andrée, S. A.] [Maurice Feuillet.] Five original sketches by Maurice Feuillet, and two original photographs, showing the hangar on Spitsbergen and departure of Andrée's balloon in 1897.

Together five original pencil sketches, each approx. $18 \times 10.5 \text{cm.}$, each captioned by hand and signed and dated "M. Feuillet 97", in very good condition, with two original photographs, approx. $7 \times 7 \text{ cm.}$, both somewhat faded.

In 1897 Salomon-August Andrée attempted to reach the North Pole by balloon. His departure, from Dane Island, Svalbard, is recorded in the present pencil sketches. The work of Maurice Feuillet 1873-1968), an illustrator and journalist, they depict three scenes in the preparation for Andrée's expedition, and two of his departure. The captions read:

"Le debarquement de la nacelle" - The unloading of the gondola;

"Verification du contours du ballon" - Checking the contours of the balloon;

"La maison de l'explorateur Pike (Pikes' hus) qui a servie de refuge à Andrée et ses companons" - The house of explorer Pike (Pike's house) which served as a shelter for Andrée and his companions;

"Départ d'Andrée 1 minute 1/2 après le départ" - Departure of Andrée 1 1/2 minutes after departure;

"2 minutes après le départ - Andrée grâce à ses voiles a pu changer de direction" - 2 minutes after departure - Andrée thanks to the sails was able to change direction.

The two accompanying photographs show cropped versions of the first two sketches. Four of the sketches also feature marks relating to their appearance in a journal or newspaper - "1 col.", "2 col.", "montagnes couvertes de neige" - but we have not been able to determine whether the images were ever published. Nor is it clear whether Feuillet himself was present, or simply made the sketches from photographs provided to him.

Andrée's attempt failed: he and his two companions perished in their effort to walk back to Spitsbergen after their balloon crashed, and their bodies and journal were discovered only in 1930.

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Together 10 real photographic postcards, each captioned, numbered consecutively from 2301 to 2310, postally unused, minor foxing to versos, else in very good condition.

See C & G p. 88. In 1928 Umberto Nobile reached the North Pole aboard the airship Italia, but on its return the airship crashed just short of the coast of eastern Svalbard. The first ever international Polar sea and air rescue mission went in search of the expedition crew. Among those who went to assist was Roald Amundsen, whose plane disappeared during the course of the search. The present photographs show scenes before the departure of the expedition, concluding with an image of the Hobby, one of the ships that took part in the search for Nobile and his companions. We have been unable to discover whether the ten cards offered here form a complete set, though they are numbered sequentially with the manufacturers' codes.

The author, a surgeon, travelled with a party of fifteen on this yacht voyage that took them to Iceland, the Faroe Islands, and Norway (Bergen and the neighbouring fjord regions). The account is illustrated by real photographs taken by another member of the crew, Doctor Richard Caton.

Barlow (1776-1862) was a mathematician, physicist and optician. In this essay he described experiments which led to the invention of a small device - an iron plate - that corrects ships' compasses with regard to the deviation caused by the iron in their guns. Barlow corrects a rule developed by Captain Matthew Flinders and later modified by Captain Edward Sabine. Sabine had recently returned from John Ross's expedition in search of a North West Passage, and indeed Barlow reports on experiments made using his new device that Sabine conducted on board the ship Isabella - one of two that took part in the Ross expedition - in Brassa Sound, Shetland. Barlow also reproduces as an appendix Sabine's article for the Philosophical Transactions, 'On the irregularities observed in the direction of the compass needles of H.M.S. Isabella and Alexander', which discusses observations made during Ross's expedition.

Yakushi G249. This report provides an account of Anglo-Bhutanese relations at the time of the Anglo-Bhutanese war of 1864, and details of Sir Ashley Eden's mission of 1863-4. Eden visited the Bhutanese to contest their harbouring of Sikkimese dissidents after the Anglo-Sikkimese war of 1861, and to protest against outrages conducted on British territory. The mission failed, with Eden humiliated, and this led to the 1864 war. A further report appeared in 1866 (Further Papers relating to Bhutan), not offered here.

Theakstone pp. 35-6. The traveller Isabella Bird (later Bishop, her married name) visited the Rocky Mountains in 1873, basing her book on the letters she wrote home to her sister. They include a description of her ascent of Long's Peak with her guide, 'Mountain Jim'. First published in 1879, this seventh edition was issued in Murray's Shilling Library, and this copy retains its original dust-wrapper, a rare survival. It carries a list of other titles in the Library on the rear cover.

Bligh's Voyage in the Resource from Coupang to Batavia together with the log of his subsequent passage to England in the Dutch packet Vlydt and his remarks on Morrison's journal. NMMC 1.625a; Pertelote 120. The first appearance in print of Captain Bligh's *Voyage in the Resource*, with details of the events following the mutiny on the Bounty during the taxing journey to Batavia, and the return to Britain.






12. [British Association for the Advancement of Science. Australia Meeting. 1914; Antarctic.] A collection of materials relating to the visit of Mr. and Mrs. Ewen with the BAAS under Sir Oliver Lodge to Australia, and onwards via New Zealand and North America, 1914.

The 1914 annual meeting for the British Association for the Advancement of Science took place in various cities across Australia. The physicist Sir Oliver Lodge sailed for Australia in July aboard S.S. "Orvieto" with a party that included Mr. J. T. Ewen – a school inspector from Aberdeen - and his wife Isabella, and a large number of other scientists and specialists. Among them were six members of various Antarctic expeditions, namely T. W. Edgeworth David (Shackleton's British Antarctic Expedition 1907-9), John King Davis (Captain of the Aurora with Mawson and later Shackleton), Robert Rudmose-Brown (Scottish National Antarctic Expedition 1901-4), George Simpson (British Terra Nova Expedition 1910-13), Hartley T. Ferrar (National Antarctic Expedition 1901-4), and Andrew Dougal Watson (Australian Antarctic Expedition 1911-14). Lectures on board the "Orvieto" were provided by the scientists, and Davis speaking on "Australian Antarctic Exploration" (the Mawson expedition was at that point returning from the Antarctic).

Ewen kept a diary of his trip, making brief daily entries, with details of lectures, places visited in Australia, and of his onward journey through Toronto and other cities in North America. Alongside this, his wife Isabella collected signatures from those they met, initially on board the "Orvieto", later at the various meetings of the BAAS, including dignitaries, functionaries, journalists, educationalists, and others from the various cities that they visited (Sydney, Hobart, Melbourne, Wellington, Auckland, Toronto). The signatures include those of Lodge and his family, the six Antarctic explorers, and members of Captain Robert F. Scott's family, then resident in Hobart with Scott's sister Ettie and her husband William Ellison-Macartney (Governor of Tasmania). Other notable signatures include the anthropologist Alfred C. Haddon, the botanist F. O. Bower, the Australian artist Alfred Coffey, R. J. Meagher (Mayor of Hobart), and senators of the Commonwealth of Australia (Jas. T. Long, James Guy, R. K. Ready, W. H. Laird Smith).

A few photographs accompany the collection. A real photograph postcard shows a group of BAAS attendees, with most identified to the verso including Mr. and Mrs. Ewen. Two more images show a small group speaking with an unidentified indigenous Australian. A fourth photograph appears to show the Ewens in a mine with some of the workers.

According to a review in the August 1880 issue of the *Proceedings of the Royal Geographical Society*, this is an "unpretentious account of the navigation, physics, and fisheries of the Northern Atlantic, compiled with the object of interesting passengers to the United States". The author covers the history of navigation, steamship lines, physical geography, animal life, with chapters devoted to 'Icebergs, glaciers, field-ice, etc.' and 'The Whale and seal fisheries in the Northern Atlantic'. These chapters contain information relating to Arctic exploration.

Bulletin no. 39. "This publication has been written with the object of supplying the latest available information on the cultivation of oil palm on a plantation scale in this country" (Preface).

15. [Burrard Neale, Admiral Sir Harry.] Funeral of Admiral Sir Harry Burrard Neale, Baronet, G.C.B. on Tuesday, February 18th, 1840. *N.p.*, n.d. ?1840.

First separate edition. A bifolium, approx. 19 x 23cm., printed to first page only within a black memorial border; creased, minor marginal closed tears, else in good condition.

Admiral Sir Harry Burrard Neale (1765-1840) followed a naval career, seeing action at Charleston in 1780 during the American Revolutionary War, during the Napoleonic Wars, and during the mutiny at the Nore. He was appointed a Lord of the Admiralty 1804-7, and became an MP for Lymington several times in his lifetime. This memorial notice was reprinted from *The Morning Post* for 24th February, 1840, and records his burial service in Lymington.



The first commission of H.M.S. Ajax records her voyages in the Mediterranean, the West Indies, and South America. At the end of 1936 Ajax sailed farther south, via the Falklands, to South Georgia. The chapter devoted to this period relates details of the islands, the visit of the Governor to Shackleton's grave, and an account of the whaling industry. While in Antarctic waters, Ajax was called to assist RRS Discovery, in the search for six men landed at Esther Harbour, King George Island, the most northerly of the South Shetland group. An illustration shows the lost party returning. The book is uncommon, with only two copies located in institutional holdings.

An early biography of Cabot, printed at the Chiswick Press by Whittingham and Wilkins. The intriguing presentation inscription reads "Miss Henrietta Reid from her affectionate brother F. Whittingham 7th Jany 1870".


A head and shoulders portrait, photographer's details printed at foot and to verso of card, identified in pencil to verso, VG.

The Duke of Argyll (1823-1900) made contributions to geology, and opposed the Darwinian idea of continuous evolution. He espoused instead a form of 'serial creation', in which he posited multiple acts of creation resulting in the existence of organisms that contained a 'plan' through which the complexities of development could be examined and understood. He was nonetheless one of the ten pallbearers at the funeral of Charles Darwin.

Charcot's French Antarctic Expedition began as a search for Nordenskjöld, from whose Swedish Antarctic Expedition there had been no word in the spring of 1903. However, on reaching Buenos Aires and finding that the Swedish expedition had returned safely, Charcot continued to the Palmer Archipelago and the Graham Land Coast. There, in spite of damage sustained by the Français, the expedition succeeded in discovering 620 miles of new coasts and islands, making an accurate map of the Graham Land Archipelago and numerous scientific observations. The present first edition of Charcot's account carries a three-fold Antarctic association: signed by Charcot himself, the book once formed part of the library of R. N. Rudmose Brown, a member of the Scottish Antarctic Expedition of 1902-4; it subsequently passed into the collection of Raymond J. Adie, director of the British Antarctic Survey and the first South African to land on the Antarctic continent.

A large handbill, approx. 27 x 10", printed on silk to one side only, fringed to top and bottom margins; creased where some time folded, minor fraying to margins at one or two points, else in very good condition.

Opened in 1838, the Swiss Gardens in Shoreham by Sea hosted days of festivities such as that advertised here. Under the patronage of Lieut.-Col. Whyte of the Seventh Royal Hussars, music for the occasion was provided by the regiment's band. The day also included "Dissolving Views", among them "a Panorama of the Late War in China" (a reference to the first Opium War), illuminated by "the Hydro-Oxygen Light". Entertainment was also provided in the form of "Tableaux Vivants, from Campbell's Poem of The Chieftain; or, Lord Ullin's Daughter" (with recitation by Mr. Lipscombe).

Oblong 8vo album containing 52 photographs on 48 leaves, the majority approx. 4×3 " (9.5 x 7 cms.), four approx. $6 \cdot 1/4 \times 4 \cdot 1/2$ " (16 x 11 cms.), and one composite photograph approx. $17 \cdot 1/2 \times 4$ " (45 x 10 cms.), most captioned by hand; some fading to a few images, else good in contemporary album, half sheep, minor wear to extremities.

This album documents the journey made by a Mr. and Mrs. Edkins, and Ada (possibly their daughter), along the Yangtze to Nanking, with views in and around the city. The photographs show scenes along the Yangtze (Kiang-yin, Chinkiang, Silver Island), and in and around Nanking, Among the latter are images of the Edkinses' "calvalcade", views of the gates, silk workers, and the avenue of stone animals. The composite photographs offer a "Panoramic View from Nankin City Wall".

Altick, The shows of London, p. 211. The Cosmorama was an indoor version of the old peepshow, using well-executed small oil paintings and mirrors to create the effect of perspective. The first London exhibition opened in 1820 but moved to Regent Street in May 1823 where adequate natural lighting was available. During the first few years, scenes were changed once a month. The present catalogue contains descriptions of seven exhibits, of which the first and longest is devoted to a view of Mont Blanc (pp. 3-5). There follow two descriptions of the Palace of Versailles, one of the Palace of the Sultana Hadidge in Constantinople, "The Passage of the Quindu in the Andes", and two descriptions of Cordova and its cathedral. This catalogue was issued several times in the 1820s, but we have found no copy of the present version in any institutional holding.

The only known complete set of this rare photographic travel book depicting the various expeditions of the Scottish peer, explorer, author, and artist Charles Adolphus Murray, 7th Earl of Dunmore (1841-1907). "A strong and active man, Dunmore travelled in many parts of the world, including Africa and the Arctic, but his principal journey was made in 1892 through Kashmir, western Tibet, Chinese Tartary, and Russian central Asia. He started from Rawalpindi in April 1892, reached Kashgar in Chinese Turkestan in December 1892, and continued west through Ferghana and Transcaspia, reaching Samarkand in January 1893. He had ridden and walked 2500 miles, traversing forty-one mountain passes and sixty-nine rivers. His account of the journey, The Pamirs (1893), was a pleasant travel book" (ODNB). The two volumes offered here comprise "reproductions, in Autotype, of rough pen and ink and water-coloured sketches, made mostly by me at various times and in various places . . . representing the result of thirty-five years' travel in different parts of the world" (Preface to volume I). The first volume commences with images of Spitsbergen, before offering images of Hammerfest "the northernmost town in Europe", Lapland and the Tana River (Finland). It then moves to views of the Circassian coast and the Caucasus, Georgia, and then Russian Central Asia and Chinese Turkestan before the large group depicting the Pamirs. The second volume opens with coastal scenes of Hong Kong and China (including two plates showing the execution of pirates) and Japan. An extensive section relating to Canada (with many depictions of indigenous peoples), continues with images of the Caribbean, Corfu, Turkey, Lebanon, Syria, South Africa, East Africa, Mashonaland (Zimbabwe, again with numerous scenes of the local population), Sri Lanka, and the South Sea Islands (including ethnographic plates and four double-page views of New Caledonia). Individual volumes of the work occasionally come to the market, but only a single copy of the fir

The present paper works on "the statistical extension of relativity theory".

The sets were on sale in England and India at 6d. for each set of 6. The paper envelope in which each set was contained is extremely flimsy, and very few of these envelopes survive.



Together two photograph albums containing over 250 snapshots and larger images recording McLean's time on the Everest expedition, six original letters from the expedition to his family (four in original envelopes), two telegrams, two albums with newspaper cuttings of the expedition and related ephemera including a letter from C. G. Bruce; McLean's compass; a copy of the expedition book by Hugh Ruttledge, *Everest 1933*, presented to McLean by the Mount Everest Committee and with McLean's inscription; a specimen of rock from Everest mounted on a plinth taken from the Dead Sea; together with a further photograph album of approx. 70 snapshots recording McLean's climbs in the Alps with the economist A. C. Pigou, including several of their joint ascent of Mont Blanc with George Mallory and H. E. L. Porter, with an accompanying MS list of McLean's climbs from 1919 to 1933 (Everest); and also with a photograph album of approx. 80 captioned images from McLean's time in Jerusalem, a book presented to McLean on his 1944 departure from Palestine; and finally a large photograph album with 28 large format images of McLean and his brother Charles F. McLean, showing their careers from school at Repton and culminating with the printed invitation and order of service for McLean's 1936 wedding.

William Walter McLean (b. May 7th, 1899) was the son of the Rev. William McLean, some time vicar of St. Giles', Bodiam, Kent. William Walter and his brother attended Repton School, William taking a keen interest in sport, and both went on to become doctors after service during WWI, William eventually establishing a medical practice in the West End. William spent the summer of 1919 climbing with Arthur Cecil Pigou (1877-1959), the Cambridge economist, and made an ascent of the Rochers route over Mont Blanc with Pigou and another party that included George Mallory and his climbing partner Harold Porter. The earliest of the photograph albums contains small snapshots of the ascent, including images of Pigou and Mallory that are duplicated in Harold Porter's diaries of the period (held by the Alpine Club). Mallory himself mentioned the climb in his lecture to the Alpine Club in May 1920 ('Our 1919 Journey', *AJ* 1920, in which McLean is mentioned by name).

The McLean family had a strong interest in mission work - the Rev. McLean had been a C.M.S. missionary in India - and in the early 1930s William McLean was appointed to a position with the English Mission to the Jews in Jerusalem. Before he had taken up the position, he also received an invitation to join the new Everest expedition under Hugh Ruttledge, as a second medical officer (the chief officer being Raymond Greene, brother of the novelist Graham Greene). McLean joined the expedition, on which he made extensive use of both his medical knowledge and climbing experience: he is mentioned several times in Ruttledge's official account of the expedition (*Everest 1933*), as also in the diary of expedition member C. G. Crawford (published in the *Alpine Iournal*, 1934). The archive includes letters written to his family from Base Camp and camps 1 to III, describing the journey to Everest, and his experiences while there. The photograph albums record his departure from Europe, arrival in India, and passage to Base Camp; there are also high altitude images from each of the camps up to Camp IV, presumably all taken by McLean himself.

Following his return from the expedition, McLean commenced medical work in the Jerusalem mission. During this time he met Dr. Susan Shanks Crosley of the American Mission Hospital, Deir-ez-Zor, Syria; they were married at St. Giles', Bodiam, in England, the service being officiated by McLean's father, the vicar. The couple returned to Palestine, and the later material includes an album of images taken during a tour of the Holy Land, and a book presented to them in December 1944 "on their departure from Palestine, after twelve years of devoted service in the medical and missionary cause of the Holy Land", with the names of their friends and fellow workers. A geological specimen in the archive nicely encompasses McLean's twin interests: A piece of rock collected during the Everest expedition lettered "EVEREST 1933" to the plinth, itself stone taken from the Dead Sea - thereby connecting the highest and lowest land regions on the planet, as recorded by the notes to the base: "Everest stone +29,028ft 1933 Dead Sea Stone -1,286ft".


Neate S46; Perret 4036. Forbes (1809-1868) spans the period from de Saussure to Wills, in other words from the first explorations of the Alps to the golden age of climbing. His alpinism derived from an interest in geology, and more specifically in glaciology. Between 1832 and 1844 he travelled extensively through the district between Provence and Tirol, making ascents of the Jungfrau, the Stockhorn and Wäsenhorn. In 1841 he joined Louis Agassiz at his research camp on the Unteraar glacier. He subsequently published Travels through the Alps of Savoy (1843), which became a reference work for both scientists and mountaineers. The present work provides the first biography of the Scottish scientist, and contains two early photographs of Mont Blanc.





Jordan was an amateur scientist with an interest in oceanography. His central oceanographic principle derived from the idea that currents and tides were due to the rotation of the earth. In the first work contained in this volume, Jordan uses his ideas to attack suggestions of W. B. Carpenter, in charge of the oceanographic cruises of H.M.S. Porcupine in the years 1869-70. Jordan's *Treatise* (1868), the second work in this volume, sets out his theory on both pure and applied levels. Making reference to previous treatments by James Rennell and Major Maury, Jordan also cites the findings of Ross and Wilkes in the Antarctic regions, and Richards in the West Indies. In illustration of his theories, Jordan provides various schematic illustrations, as well as a folding chart of the Antarctic, and a large world chart showing currents. Each of these works are uncommon, and in particular the *Remarks*, as well as the supplements to the *Treatise*, all three of which titles were published in Buenos Aires, are scarce.

This catalogue for the publisher Richard Bentley includes, at the top of p. 20, a notice for Richard King's Narrative of a Journey to the Shores of the Arctic Ocean in 1833, 1834, & 1835; under the Command of Captain Back, R.N., priced at 12 shillings. Other books advertised include Lamartine's Pilgrimage to the Holy Land, Syria, &c.; Ruschenberger's A Voyage round the World; James Baillie Frasier's Residence of the Persian Princes in London; and Laird and Oldfield's Narrative of the Last Expedition into Central Africa. Also featured is Captain Sir John Ross's Memoirs and Correspondence of Admiral Lord de Saumarez. The catalogue also lists works of fiction, including a forthcoming three-volume novel by Charles Dickens, simply referred to as "A New Work of Fiction" (p. 7); it also features details of the Dickens-edited Memoirs of Joseph Grimaldi, the Clown (p. 28).

Prior to that, Lachenal had made the second ascent of the north face of the Eiger, with Lionel Terray. He died at Chamonix, while skiing, in 1955, and the following year his journals were published as Carnets de Vertige. Reissued several times in the years that followed, the present edition first appeared in 1996, and in this second edition of the following year; it offers a fuller version of Lachenal's notebooks, with the addition of new matter and numerous illustrations.

It shows reserves and waterways through the southern part of the country, then under control of the British South African Company (founded by Cecil Rhodes).





This scarce booklet - OCLC records only five library copies - opens with the justification "A few lines on Scutari and its objects of interest may at the present time prove acceptable, particularly as the proceeds of this little work are to be given to the Sick and Wounded, now in our Hospitals in the East". The references are to the Crimean War, and more specifically to the work of Florence Nightingale among the wounded, and the book devotes a chapter to her work at Scutari. The portrait frontispiece shows a woman reading a letter bearing the address "Miss Nightingale Scutari" - possibly a letter from her, or to her. The book also has a chapter on the Scutari cemetery.

Edward Harper Parker (1849-1926) trained as a barrister, and from 1869 travelled in Mongolia, later serving at the British Consulates in Wenzhou, Fuzan, and Shanghai. He studied Chinese, and wrote on Chinese topics, including linguistics. The present work was "intended to give . . . the substance of all the Chinese have to say about the nomad Tartars previous to the conquests of Genghis Khan" (Preface). 

of Indian geography, society, natural history, and

the like. The second part comprises Erskine's 'Journal of a Vacation Trip in India, through Rajputana, the North-West Provinces, and Nepal', the high-point of which is his visit to Katmandu.







Wäber 1.42. Grégoire de Razoumovsky (or Grigory Razumovsky, 1759-1837) was a Ukrainian nobleman who studied the natural sciences with Professor Allamand at the University of Leiden. Through his acquaintance with H.-B. de Saussure, he devoted himself to geology, and the present Voyage minéralogique was his first scientific work (there are passing references in it to de Saussure). In 1784 Mourer published Razoumovsky's Voyage minéralogique dans le gouvernement d'Aigle, and also in the same year issued both works under the collected title Oeuvres de Monsieur le Comte Grégoire de Razoumovsky, apparently from the same sheets used for the separate editions; the absence of a half-title in the present copy suggests that it may derive from the Oeuvres, but in either case Razoumovsky's work is scarce.

Clara Colliver Rice (1866-1952) was the wife of Walter Rice, a missionary in Persia from 1901 to 1921. She knew Mary Bird, the first woman sent out by the Church Missionary Society, and wrote *Mary Bird in Persia* as a record of Bird's work among the women of the country. Persian Women and their Ways describes the women of different groups in the Persia, with additional chapters on food, feasts, shopping, and similar.

Robb (1873-1936) was described by Joseph Larmor in his obituary notice on Robb as "one of the main protagonists in the scientific domain now known as relativity" (*Biographical Memoirs of Fellows of the Royal Society*, 1938). He published this and other titles on the special theory of relativity, providing an axiomatic-geometric approach to the spacetime derivation of the theory.

Conrad 347-54 (with mention of report 8 only). Finn Ronne's private Antarctic expedition of 1947-8 was funded by the American Geographical Society, the Office of Naval Research, and the North American Newspaper Alliance. "His objectives were to . . . explore the Weddell Sea's coastline and mountain ranges on the Palmer Peninsula, conduct aerial and surface mapping, determine if the Weddell and Ross Seas connected, and complete an extensive scientific program" (Conrad). The expedition successfully "explored over 250,000 square miles for the first time and took over 14,000 photos - with ground control - of 450,000 additional square miles" (Conrad). The scientific reports from the expedition are uncommon, and complete sets rarely come onto the market. This set once belonged to Raymond Adie, onetime director of the Scott Polar Research Institute, who spent the winters of 1947-9 in the Antarctic, making many sledge journeys with Vivian Fuchs (former owner of report 6).

This account of her career first appeared in German (1998), this was the first English translation. It has been signed by nine Polish climbers who took part in expeditions with Rutkiewicz, and also has a postcard signed by her and her climbing companion Ewa Panjeko-Pankiewicz.

This is the story of the making of *Aurora Australis*, the first book written, printed, illustrated and bound in Antarctica, during Sir Ernest Shackleton's Nimrod Expedition, 1907-9. Shackleton took to the Antarctic an Albion hand-press, an etching press, and Caslon Old Face type and materials, including Abbey Mills Greenfield paper, to produce his letterpress printed book. James Freemantle wrote *An Albion in the Antarctic* based on original research using contemporary records at the Scott Polar Research Institute, the Royal Geographical Society, the Saint Bride Foundation and other sources. This is the first appearance of his book, in a letter-press version of forty-one copies printed on an Albion press in homage to the printing of the *Aurora Australis*, with a wood-engraved frontispiece after an original by Paul Kershaw, tipped-in samples, and watermarked pages.





Gagarin was the first human to reach space, on the 12 April 1961. This memoir - the title translates Road to Space. Notes of a USSR's pilot-cosmonaut - appeared only a few months after his space-flight. With a foreword by Nikolaj Kamanin (1808-82), head of cosmonaut training in the Soviet space programme and the man who made the final selection of Gagarin, the book tells the story of the modest young man from humble beginnings, and his path from a war-torn Russia, through his work as a mechanic and later an aviator, to his epoch-making journey into space. He inscribed this copy - with the words "To the vice-chairman in the Denmark-Soviet Union Society Mr Jensen and his wife with respect, Gagarin" (translation) - to Alfred Jensen (1903-1988), a member of the Danish Communist Party and its leader during the years of Nazi occupation. In 1952 Jensen married Ragnhild Andersen, and it is her address label that appears beneath the inscription. Jensen and Ragnhild remained loyal to Moscow when the Danish Communist Party, under its leader Aksel Larsen, distanced itself from the Soviet Union; their meeting with Gagarin, and the inscribed copy of his book, might be regarded as a reward for their loyalty.

Published by NASA and one of their first printed reports, this volume contains ten conference papers on Project Mercury and the first manned American space flight, officially named Mercury-Redstone 3, by Alan Shepard. The papers are divided into three sections, Mercury Program Summary, Bio-medical Data, and Pilot Performance. The Swedish military physician Carl-Johan Clemedson (1918–90) was working for Försvarets forskningsanstalt (The Swedish Defence Research Agency) and was one of the first scientists in Sweden to take an interest in space medicine. He was a member of The International Academy of Astronautics.



With Mercury-Atlas 7, as the mission was officially named, Carpenter became the second American astronaut – following John Glenn – to complete an orbital space flight. The report contains sections on spacecraft and launch-vehicle performance, Mercury network performance, mission operations, space science report, aeromedical studies, pilot performance and the pilot's flight report. Brigadier general Don Davis Flickinger was a US military flight surgeon who served as vice chairman in the NASA Special Committee on Life Sciences, which provided medical guidance for Project Mercury. For Carl-Johan Clemedson, see previous item.

The Apollo 15 mission became the fourth to land on the moon, and the ninth crewed mission in the Apollo programme. The longer time spent on the moon, the emphasis on science, and the first use of a Lunar Roving Vehicle marked it as a new departure. The crew - David Scott, James Irwin, and pilot Alfred Worden - were given extensive geological training. Scott and Irwin spent 18 1/2 hours on the moon during four long excursions on the rover, collecting 77 kilos of surface material that was brought back to earth. Worden, in lunar orbit, made measurements of the moon using cameras, spectrometers, and an altimeter. On their return journey, Worden also made the first spacewalk in deep-space. The present work offers some of the initial findings from their mission, and it was presented by the crew to Carl-Johan Clemedson, for whom see item 62.



This French edition corrects some of the author's

formulae and makes new comparisons between transit instruments devised and built by Troughton and by Ertel. A fascinating work revealing the scientific advances in the making of instruments that would revolutionise navigation.

Theobald (1829-1908) served in Burma with the Geological Survey of India, and published several works on shells and reptiles relating to the country. The present pamphlet, printed for private circulation, takes issue with statements made by Gray in notes to his *Catalogue of Shield Reptiles*, and in the journal literature, concerning the identification of Trionyx species.



Timour the Tartar, a play by Matthew "Monk" Lewis with music by Matthew King, was first performed at the Theatre Royal, Covent Garden, in May 1811. The drama, which featured live horses at its finale, caricatured Napoleon by its depiction of Timour (also known as Tamerlane, or Tamburlaine), a man of low birth who rose to lead an empire. The present version of the play, accompanied by sheets of characters and scenes, was published for the toy theatre market. Purchasers were able to choose the sheets, colour them, and mount them on card ready for domestic performance. The portraits and scenes depicted on these sheets were generally taken from stage versions, so that these juvenile theatre plates can often offer representations of actual stagings. Redington, a publisher of toy theatre material, died in 1876, and his business was taken over by his son-in-law Benjamin Pollock. The plates in this set are probably due to Redington (i.e. pre-1876), but the booklet may derive from a later period after Pollock had taken over the firm.

This programme records the races for the sixth day of the race meeting in Makri-Keuy (also known as Mackrochori, modern Turkish Bakırköy), in 1922. The location for the events is not given - perhaps Veliefendi Race Course - and the programme provides details of the Racing Syndicate committee - the President was Ömer Faruk Efendi - conditions of participation, and a list of six events with names of the riders and horses. The text is printed in French and Ottoman Turkish.

Wallin (1811-1852) was a Finnish oriental scholar, who in 1843 travelled to Cairo, where he grew acquainted with Islam and its customs. Adopting the Muslim name of Abd Al-Wali, he set off in 1845 via Medina to Mecca, continuing to Jeddah before returning to Cairo. The following year he visited Palestine and Syria; in 1847 he intended to explore the Wahhabi region of Najd, but his adopted Muslim identity was compromised and he instead travelled in Mesopotamia and Persia. An account of his travels appeared in the *Journal of the Royal Geographical Society* (volume 20, 1851), but his journals and letters first appeared in the present form, published in Helsinki, the town in which he first studied.


One of the earliest notices of Wallin's travels in the Middle East, albeit advertised by the publisher as a "Fragment". This record of Wallin's first travels provides details of the initial part of his journey from Cairo, into the Sinai peninsula (An-Nekhel fortress). It includes some of Wallin's observations on Arab and Bedouin customs, and reproduces for instance his conversation with a Bedouin Sheikh.

This, one of two theses submitted by Wallin to the University of Helsinki, is a 'Dissertation on the main difference between the modern Arabic language and the ancient one'. The work was one result of the studies which prompted Wallin to make his journeys into the Middle East.

"In 1887 the author visited Sikkim for the first time, and joined the expeditionary force of the Sikkim-Nepal War in 1888 as Assistant Political Officer, and then he stayed in Sikkim as the first Political Officer for twenty years. He entered Talung glacier in 1890, and Lhonak in 1891. When he visited Lhonak again as a member of the Sikkim-Tibet Boundary Committee in 1902, he explored there fully. In 1903-04 he accompanied the Younghusband Mission to Lhasa. Moreover, he visited Bhutan as a government delegate in 1905 and in 1907, and explored Eastern Bhutan in 1906" (Yakushi).

Wilberforce (1805-1873), the son of William Wilberforce, became Bishop of Oxford, and in the 1860 Oxford debate on Evolution opposed Darwin's views as championed by Thomas Huxley.

AB 19493 (trade edition). This is Wilkins' account of the projected submarine expedition to explore the Arctic Basin north of Spitsbergen in the submarine Nautilus. It contains chapters by members of the expedition, and also Vilhjalmar Stefansson's chapter on "The History of the Idea" and a reproduction of the chapter from Bishop John Wilkins' Mathematicall Magick (1648) "in which this ancestor of Sir Hubert Wilkins so amazingly foresees modern submarine exploration..." This copy of the limited signed edition was additionally inscribed by Wilkins in 1933, as also by Vilhjalmar Stefansson, leader of the Canadian Arctic Expedition 1913-16 on which Wilkins was second in command.

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
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
